### **Correct Answers and Rationales**

#### Question 1 Correct Answer and Rationale: b. Data

<u>Rationale</u>: In a case report, the data consists of information related to only the case report, such as a DNA mutation or an image. A grant-funded research paper generally has a lot more information in the data section and likely includes statistics. The other sections of a case report and grant-funded research paper are similar.

## Question 2 Correct Answer and Rationale: a. AIDS

<u>Rationale</u>: AIDS was described as a case report in the 1980's. Giant cell hepatitis was first described in the 1950's and 1960's. N-Glycanase 1 Deficiency was first described as numerous patients with whole exome sequencing. Rett syndrome was first described in a series of female patients in the 1960's.

# Question 3 Correct Answer and Rationale: c. Submit the case report manuscript as an editorial

<u>Rationale</u>: Journals that generally only publish scientific research manuscripts may consider a case report in the editorial category.
